

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
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
Ryan Budget Priorities: What's Cut, What's Increased, and What's Missing

*Reflects outlays for mandatory programs and budget authority for discretionary programs Source: Ryan budget, CBPP estimates


69 Percent of Cuts in Ryan Plan Come From Programs for People with Low or Moderate Incomes


Ryan Budget Plan Would Slash Federal Medicaid and CHIP Funding by More Than One-Quarter in 2024*


Two-Fifths of SNAP Households Are Below Half the Poverty Line



219 Reps voted for...

- Repealing the health care law that new Gallup Poll estimates has so far brought the number of uninsured down from 43.5m to 36.3m;
- All health care cuts would add up to 40m people denied health insurance through FY 2024;
- Slashing SNAP/food stamps by \$137b, denying food altogether to millions and/or cutting benefits harshly;
- Reducing SSI benefits for **150,000** children with disabilities;
- Freezing Pell Grants indefinitely at maximum \$5,730;
- In FY 2016, would cut domestic appropriations by **15%**:
 - 170,000 fewer children in Head Start
 - 200,000 fewer young children and moms served by WIC
 - 3.5 million fewer people would get job training/placement
 - **29,000** fewer teachers and aides in low-income schools

And voted for...

- Tax rate reductions that will provide millionaires with at least \$200,000 in FY 2015 alone.
- Tax cuts are worth at least \$4 trillion, paid for by a secret plan (that is bound to raise middle class taxes – say, \$2,000 per family with children).

Hold Them Accountable.

When advocates had a unified message around protecting low-income people in deficit reduction plans:

 Many key lowincome programs were exempted from cuts

But now we're too quiet.



Truth Squad Messengers



- Faith leaders: Our congregation/community benefits from (SNAP, Medicaid, unemployment benefits, homeless services...); the Ryan budget endangers our people.
- Parents: My child benefits from (Head Start...); the Ryan budget would deny Head Start to 170,000 children in FY16.
- Local officials: My community benefits from affordable housing; the Ryan budget would cut well over 100,000 rental vouchers and increase rents.
- Physicians: My patients benefit from ACA, Medicaid, SCHIP, SNAP; the Ryan budget would make them sicker.

More Messengers

- College Students: I benefit from (TRIO; Pell grants); the Ryan budget would slash/freeze these programs.
- People Getting Health Coverage: I'm now insured! The Ryan budget would take that away.
- Service Provider Agency Staff: Our clients benefit from (x); the Ryan budget would cut it by 30% in 2024.

Stories Worth Telling

(thanks to Families USA for sharing these)

 Monica had an illness that caused her to be hospitalized. She had insurance through COBRA; it was about to expire. She got a policy through the exchange, with subsidies, it costs \$197/mo. If not available, only alternative: South Carolina high risk pool, costing \$1,974 per month.

Under Ryan plan: ACA repealed.

• Nathan, of Salem, VA, was paying 55% of his income on health care. He had a brain tumor 8 years before, while he was on his parents' insurance. Then he got a high risk plan -\$483/month and \$5,000 deductible. He spent \$1,203/month on medication. New plan under ACA: 20% of his income: \$111.48 premium; \$1,567 deductible; \$2,052 cap on out-of-pocket
