State of Poverty in Mississippi

It's good news that poverty in U.S. dropped from 15.5 percent in 2014 to 14.7 percent in 2015. Unfortunately, poverty in Mississippi remains stuck at 22.0 percent and being poor comes at a high cost. Those in poverty are often forced to put more of their income toward rent, face eviction and have limited access to affordable and healthy food. Call to Action

Poverty in the U.S. declined in 2015, but there is more that needs to be done in Mississippi where the poverty rate ranks number one in the nation. In 2015, anti-poverty programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), low income tax credits, and housing vouchers lifted thousands of Mainers out of poverty. Tell [congressional representative] that expanding SNAP, the EITC and taking actions such as raising the minimum wage needs to be a priority in Mississippi to help fight poverty & increase economic mobility.
