


Two in Three Americans Support Expanding and Improving the Child Tax Credit, Including Parents and Non-Parents Alike

Majorities across party lines and racial groups support the move, ranging from 59% of Republicans (net +33 support) to 80% of Democrats (net +71). Large majorities of both parents (net +71) and non-parents (net +45) also support it.

As you may know, there is a bipartisan proposal in Congress to temporarily expand and improve the Child Tax Credit to refund poor, working, and middle-class families more money for each child under age 17. It is paid for by ending some COVID-era relief programs for businesses. Would you support or oppose this agreement?



Americans Would Blame Republicans in Congress More Than Democrats if the Child Tax Credit Proposal Is Not Passed

Independents are most likely to blame both parties equally if the Child Tax Credit fails to pass (42%), while pluralities of Democrats (47%), Black Americans (34%), and Hispanic Americans (34%) would blame the Republican Party the most.
